### Veterans Post



An elderly Vietnam-era veteran is being hounded by a government agency that is insisting he pay back a loan he never took out.

The Small Business Administration (SBA) says he took out the loan in 2021, and if he doesn't pay it back, they will take 15% of his Social Security check until it's paid for.

The veteran has tried to tell them he never applied for nor received any loan, that he hadn't owned a business (and therefore didn't qualify for a business loan), and the SBA wants him to prove it.

How do you prove a negative?

It seems that the SBA would have records of where they sent that loan money, if indeed the loan was issued. But, they're insisting the veteran prove he didn't get the

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curity check this year is around \$1,782. Taking away 15% leaves \$1,514. Even before deducting that 15%, it's not a lot of money, and the veteran probably doesn't have a lot to spare at the end of the month.

If you're the victim of fraud such as this, deal directly with the SBA Office of Inspector General and file a complaint. As an added step, consider submitting a FOIA request for all documents related to the problem, such as the loan application itself.

But a quick look on the internet shows that this veteran is only one of many this has happened to -people being nailed for loans they never received. When they complain, all are being told to send in a long list of financial documents, such as tax returns. At first glance it looks like a scam to steal personal information.

### **Health Ins. Options** For Early Retirees

### Dear Savvy Senior,

I'm going to retire in a few months and need to get some temporary health insurance until I can enroll in Medicare at age 65. What are my options?

### -Early Retiree

### Dear Early,

There are several places early retirees can find health insurance coverage before Medicare kicks in, but the best option for you will depend on your income level, your health care needs and how long you'll need coverage for. Here's where to look.

Affordable Care Act: For most early retirees who aren't yet eligible for Medicare, the Affordable Care Act (ACA) health insurance marketplace, also known as Obamacare, is the best option for getting comprehensive health coverage. And you won't be denied coverage or charged extra for preexisting health conditions.

And, if your income falls below the 400 percent poverty level after you retire - anything below \$60,240 for a single or \$81,760 for a couple in 2024 - you'll also be eligible for a subsidy that will reduce your monthly premiums. The ACA also ensures that at least through 2025, households with incomes above that 400 percent poverty level will not have to pay

more than 8.5 percent of their income for a benchmark policy. To see how much you may be eligible for, use Kaiser Family Foundation subsidy calculator at KFF.org/interactive/subsidy-calculator.

To shop for ACA plans in your state, visit HealthCare.gov or call 800-318-2596. Or, if you want some extra help, contact a certified agent or broker at HealthCare. gov/find-assistance.

COBRA: temporary Another health insurance option you may be eligible for is the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA). Under this federal law, if you work for a company that has 20 or more employees, you can remain on your employer's group health plan for at least 18 months - but could last up to 36 months. But be aware that CO-BRA isn't cheap. You'll pay the full monthly premium yourself, plus a 2 percent administrative fee.

To learn more, talk to your employer benefits administrator or contact the Employee Benefits Security Administration (Askebsa. dol.gov; 866-444-3272).

If, however, the company you work for has fewer than 20 employees, you may still be able to get continued coverage through your company if your state has "mini-COBRA." Contact your state insurance department to see if this is available where you live.

Short-Term Health Insurance: If vou can't find an affordable ACA plan and COBRA is too expensive, another possible option is short-term health insurance. These plans, which are not available in every state, are cheaper, bare-bones health plans that provide coverage for up to 3 months with a one-month extension avail-

able. But be aware that short-term plans don't comply with the ACA so they can deny sick people coverage, they don't cover preexisting conditions and they can exclude coverage essentials like prescription drugs. To find and compare short-term health plans, try sites like eHealthInsurance.com or PivotHealth.com.

If the previously listed options don't work for you, another temporary solution could be healthcare sharing ministries (HCSM). These are cost-sharing health plans.

HCSM's are cheaper than paying full out-of-pocket costs for traditional health insurance but be aware that HCSM's are not health insurance. They don't have to comply with the consumer protections of the ACA, and they can also reject or limit coverage for having pre-existing health issues and limit how much you'll be reimbursed for your medical costs. Preventive care typically isn't covered either. To look for these plans, comparison shop at the three largest providers - Samaritan Minis-(SamaritanMinistries.org), (MyChristianCare. Medi-Share org), and Christian Healthcare Ministries (Chministries.org).

### Suncoast Unveils New **Sports Book**

Suncoast's conversion of a showroom into the new sports book is complete. The sports book was officially unveiled just in time for football season. It boasts a nearly 16-foot-tall curved video wall (the curve is de rigueur nowadays) with 1,700 square feet of total high-definition screens. The former sports book is currently being converted into a new bingo room, which will be completed next year; in the meantime, bingo is played on the second floor. Further refinements to Boyd's northwest-valley resort include renovations to the casino. bowling center, and food hall and a 70-seat center bar.

Fat Sal's Opens At Neonopolis

Move over, Heart Attack Grill, Fat Sal's has come to town. Sal's, a sandwich shop with six locations in southern California, opened this week at Neonopolis, which also hosts the Heart Attack Grill. The two are of a kind—guilty pleasures calorie-wise. Fat Sal's offers Fat sandwiches, such as the Fat Breakfast, with two fried eggs, ham, bacon, sausage, mozzarella sticks, American cheese, and tater tots on a butter grilled hero (\$19); Fat Texas, with pastrami, chicken fingers, bacon, mozzarella sticks, melted mozzarella and cheddar, grilled onions, and fries on a garlic hero (\$20); Fat (\$15-\$16) and standard (\$8-\$15) burgers; heroes (\$16-\$17); Make It Fatter add-ons; And Fat shakes (\$13). The Big Fat Fatty is a 30-inch garlic hero with cheesesteak, double-cheeseburger, pastrami, chicken fingers, bacon, mozzarella sticks, fried eggs, fries, onion rings, chili, and marinara, while the Big Fat Shake is served with 30 scoops of vanilla and chocolate ice cream each, cake, cookies, pretzels, syrup, and whipped cream; they're both \$99.99.

### Jackpot At Planet Hollywood

### Four Sixes Ranch Steakhouse

Writer and director Taylor Sheridan has opened a pop-up steakhouse at the Wynn. For about 380,000 years after the Big Bang, the universe was a scalding stew of particles and photons. This stew was too dense for light to travel far. As the universe cooled and expanded, light could then travel freely. That light from 380,000 years ago is what we know as the cosmic microwave background (CMB). Astronomers study this light to learn about the formation of the universe and the nature of the cosmos.

In this FREE astronomy talk presented by the Santa Barbara Astronomical Unit, Jennifer Ito, Ph.D., will discuss her involvement with the instrumentation that measures the CMB.



### Mega Millions Prices Up, Odds Down

Changes to the multistate lottery platform Mega Millions format have been in the works for over a year, but now more details have been made available. According to PlayiLottery, which obtained documents from the Texas Lottery, the ticket price for Mega Millions will jump from \$2 to \$5; that will impel the jackpots to grow much larger much faster. Though it was earlier thought that the number of white balls would be reduced, they'll remain the same at 1 through 70. However, the number of gold Mega Balls will be dropped by one, from 25 to 24. That will increase the odds of hitting the jackpot (very slightly).

### **Tribal Gaming Sets** Revenue Record


Native American casinos set a new record for revenue last year, raking in \$41.9 billion, according to the National Indian Gaming Commission. It was the fourth consecutive year of record-breaking gaming revenue for the tribes. Profit margins, however, are contracting a bit; this was the second decrease in a row. The 2024 Indian Gaming Cost of Doing Business Report based on data collected from 132 tribal casinos in 18 states was analyzed by Wipfli consulting and accounting firm. Among Wifpli's insights: Slots are the main revenue drivers for tribal casinos; sports betting is a growing income stream but isn't yet "a significant revenue source"; and labor, marketing, and casino promotions are the highest expenses. Wipfli concluded: "Tribal casinos are spending more to promote themselves, thus decreasing their profit margins, because they have to." Competition from various sectors is a contributing factor.

### **Stake Factoring**

At a recent virtual meeting with the Massachusetts Gaming Commission, representatives from the seven largest sports books in the U.S. defended their practice of limiting or restricting the action from sharp sports bettors. This is nothing new, though the bookies are extremely averse to discussing it in public. What's somewhat new is the term, "stake factoring," the industry uses to grade how successful sports bettors are, i.e., how often they win their bets. As explained by NewBettingSites, When you first open an account with a betting company, you're given a stake factor. You can place bets up to 100% of the normal maximum stake. The stake factor gets adjusted up or down depending on whether your wager is a winner or loser. If you're a winning bettor, your stake factor is reduced by as much as 50% initially, dropping further to 25%, 10%, and eventually 1%. If you tend to lose your bets, your stake factor is increased. This means that you can place bets above the normal maximum. If the betting company thinks that you're likely to lose most of your wagers, they're more than happy to ensure that you spend more money with them." In other words, dumb money is fine, but smart money is not welcome. Reporting by The Las Vegas Advisor

# Antiques & Collecting

O: Crown Distillers suggested I contact you to see if an unopened bottle from 1968 is worth anything.

A: Crown Royal is a blended Canadian whiskey that was first made in 1939 and first sold in the United States in 1964. Twentiethcentury mass-produced bottles do not sell for as high of prices as 19th-century bottles, and serious bottle collectors, the ones who dig up antique bottles from old dumps, will not be interested in them. Unopened whiskey bottles from the 1940s, '50s and '60s tend to sell at house sales and estate auctions, not at specialized bottle auctions or shows. They may also sell at sales of whiskey or liquor bottles held by national auction houses. We have seen vintage unopened Crown Royal bottles sell for about \$150 to \$200 recently. If the original box and bag are included, the price will be higher. Empty bottles sell for much less, about \$20 to \$50. If you intend to sell your Crown Royal bottle with its contents, check state and federal laws for selling alcohol.

TIP: Don't store antique furniture in the attic, near a fireplace or near a heat duct. Basements can be damp or hot and are not a good place for furniture.

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
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


